

Oodnadatta \$200 To D. Wing

D. Wing (Hampstead) won the SA Homing Pigeon Association's \$200 Oodnadatta race from L. Randle (Gawler) on Saturday.

Aided by light tailwinds leading birds came home at more than 50 m.p.h. to reach home in the day.

Released in clear conditions at 7 a.m., the winner was clocked at Para Hills just after 5.4 p.m. and the second prizewinner reached its loft at Gumeracha about 5.11 p.m.

Returns in the day amounted to 50 p.c. and the following Sunday morning was reported to be good.

The entry of 1,732 birds representing 281 owners was a record for the race—35 prizes were paid, five more than in the same race last year.

D. Wing scored his first major success when he won the event with his yearling blue bar hens.

The winner flew very consistently in her previous races which included Marree derby and the first Marree open fixtures.

The sire is the produce of a Blanden x Pope-Etzen cock obtained from F. Delasar and a Marriott x Logan hen bred by H. L. Hobson.

The dam was bred by F. Delasar and was placed twice in association races. She is mostly Etzen.

The second prizewinner for L. Randle is a two-year-old blue bar pied hen which flew Pimba only last year.

She was a clocked bird from Carrington and arrived and secured bird home from Marree before her success on Saturday.

The sire is Cudmore Jurion and was bred by Mrs. Audrey Jones, of Murray Bridge.

The dam is Blanden and was bred by L. Naismith. Her sire won 1st Dimboola and 9th Assn. Benalla, and her dam was bred and flown by F. Wining.

H. Ford (Glynde) won third prize with a two-year-old blue che. pied hen which flew all stages to Tarcoola derby last year.

This year she has performed

consistently in her races to Marree Open.

The sire is a son of the old Delaser, and the dam is bred to the old gay pied cock North-east owners A. and J. McCauley won fourth prize with a two-year-old blue bar pied hen which flew all stages to Cook last year. She was clocked blind from Carrington and Marree Open in recent races.

The sire is Stassart and was bred by the late R. Staunton. The dam is a mixture of Kamm and Schumann purchased at the disposal sale of the late L. Close.

M. Bird (East Suburban) finished in fifth place with a yearling blue che. hen which flew all stages to Marree Derby.

The sire is an unknown hen and the dam was bred by Pearce from a cock containing all his old blood out of a Horrocks hen.

The Port Adelaide Association held its last open race from Maryborough and a good working race resulted.

J. Todd recorded the fine feat of taking first, second and fifth prizes.

Quick Trapping Is Essential

If time wastage — the interval between arrival of the bird and its time recorded in the clock — is kept at minimum, it is essential that a quick trap is used.

Most pigeons fly distances of under 400 miles and some of longer distances have been known to do so because the winning bird has been taught to do the right thing and the loser has not.

About three weeks of education should suffice, especially if the weather is cool. The team is exercising well. Provision should also be made to cover the occasion when the bird returns in "touchy" state and is about coming down at all.
